

Recent works on archives and record-keeping practices by humanities scholars

This bibliography is a work-in-progress. It attempts to catalog a growing interdisciplinary body of work that draws on the concept of “the archive” as a lens for exploring questions of history, memory, and evidence. The number of recent archives-themed courses, conferences, dissertations, articles, and books offered *outside* the archival profession demonstrates the intensity of current interest in archival studies across the humanities. This bibliography offers a sampling of recent works by humanities scholars (those not situated in library or archival studies programs) that engage with archives as a subject of research rather than simply a source for research materials.
